Wednesday July 24th - UNITED STATES TO DUBLIN

Depart Washington Dulles on Aer Lingus 118 at 5:15pm for Dublin. Enjoy in-flight entertainment and meal service as you travel to start your vacation.

Thursday July 25th - DUBLIN ARRIVAL

After landing at Dublin Airport @ 5:30am, complete customs and immigration formalities. Your Caddie Tours driver/guide will welcome you to Ireland and escort you and your luggage to the coach. We make our way to the **Camden Court Hotel** just off St. Stephen's Green where we'll have a full Irish breakfast upon arrival, hotel check-in and remainder of the day to wander and explore the city on foot. Everybody will received The Dublin Pass - a sightseeing city card which allows visitors to experience everything Dublin has to offer whilst saving both time and money. The Dublin Pass includes free entry to over 30 top attractions, monuments and museums, as well as wide range of additional discounts and dining offers.

Visit St. Kevin's monastic city at Glendalough famed for its rounds towers, and Celtic crosses which will provide you with a true insight into the workings of an early Christian monastery. Glendalough, known as the valley of 2 Lakes and surrounded by dense forests and romantic babbling brooks this is truly the picture-postcard vision of Ireland you have come to enjoy and explore.

KILKENNY

Once the capital of Ireland in the middle-ages, it is renowned for its magnificent **Norman Castle** dating back to 12th century. With its narrow street and colorful shops and buildings, Kilkenny is unique as a city and a mecca for those who choose to visit. You will have plenty of time to enjoy a pint of Kilkenny in Kilkenny (minimum stop 2hrs). We can also offer an optional tour in the afternoon –

Vintage Tea Tours. Take a step back in time with Vintage Tea Tours and experience Dublin in a unique way. Enjoy our renowned Afternoon Tea delicacies, good conversation and tap along to some

fabulous 1950's jazz. This is Afternoon Tea with a difference. This is an experience.

The Dublin Pass is still valid for today so feel free to explore Dublin.

There are several pubs and restaurants very convenient to the hotel and this is a night when you can go out and discover what the city has to offer.

Saturday, July 27th – LOCKE'S DISTILLERY & GALWAY

After breakfast drive to the center of the country to visit **Locke's Distillery** in Killbeggan. The Kilbeggan Distillery is the oldest licenced distillery in Ireland. Dating back to 1757 a visit today lets you discover real artisanal Irish whiskey distilling at its finest. Start your tour in 1757 and discover how Irish whiskey was made in decades past. Discover the families that owned the distillery in the past and the importance the local community had on what you see today. Guided tour of Kilbeggan Distillery with a Master class in tasting of three Irish whiskeys from the Kilbeggan Distilling Company. Continuing on to Galway you will find the town arty and bohemian, brightly painted pubs heave with live music, while cafes offer front-row seats for observing street performers. Steeped in history, for sure, but the city buzzes with a contemporary and cultured vibe as students make up a quarter of the population. Galway is often referred to as the 'most Irish ' of Ireland's cities, it's the only one where you're likely to hear Irish spoken in the streets, shops and pubs. Time this afternoon to go out of your city center hotel and walk the cobble stone streets. Join your fellow travelers for dinner tonight in the hotel - recommend visiting some of the locals pubs nearby to hear pipe and fiddle music.

Sunday July 28th - ARAN ISLANDS

Today we'll enjoy the Aran Islands, which consist of three islands located within Galway Bay, Inishmaan, Inisheer and the largest one that we will be visiting, Inismór. The boat will depart from **Rossaveel in Connemara** for a 45-minute ferry ride over to the port where we will be met and shown the idyllic sites and stonewalls of this beautiful 12-mile island. We'll explore **Dún Aonghasa**, a 2000-year-old semi circular stone fort overlooking the Atlantic with daunting and dramatic sea views that stretch the length of the Island. It's one of Ireland's most visited attractions, located on the 300 foot south side of Inismór. Archaeologists, scholars and tourists come here from all over the world to study Dún Aonghasa, and it is likely to be given the official status of a world heritage site in the near future. It's no wonder that National Geographic has named Inismór one of the Worlds Top Island Destinations! Stop back to the village of



Kilronan for lunch, some shopping and catch the afternoon ferry back to Galway. Enjoy some free time for dinner and discover some excellent restaurants and pubs within walking distance of the hotel.

Monday, July 29th - CLIFFS OF MOHER & DINGLE

After breakfast we may take a tour of Ireland's stony place - **The Burren**. You can find villages abandoned since famine times and green roads on which you can walk for miles without ever seeing a car. This is not the green Ireland of postcards. But there are wildflowers in spring, giving the 560-sq-km Burren brilliant, if ephemeral, color amid its ascetic beauty. Continuing on to the **Cliffs of Moher** are astonishing impressive and staggeringly beautiful. The entirely vertical cliffs rise to a height of 203m, their edge falling away abruptly into a ceaselessly churning Atlantic. A progression of vast heads, the dark limestone marches in a rigid formation that's gob-smacking, no matter how many times you look at it. As you leave the cliffs you'll travel through the little village of Liscannor and just across the bay, you'll see the beautiful seaside village and golfers' mecca, Lahinch. Continue to Killmer and cross the Shannon Estuary by ferry to Co. Kerry and onto **Dingle** for 2 nights. Join your fellow travelers for

dinner tonight at the **Coastguard Restaurant** with spectacular views of Dingle Bay. **DINNER & OVERNIGHT: DINGLE SKELIG HOTEL, DINGLE (B,D)**

Tuesday July 30th - DINGLE PENINSULA

After breakfast we explore the Dingle Peninsula. The journey begins with some of the most magnificent scenery in all of Ireland. The little town of Dingle is straight out of a story book. The fishing boats in the harbor and tiny brightly painted pubs portray a time that has continued to stand still. The population of 1500 people and only 52 pubs are ready to welcome you this afternoon. Worth the wait is the native seafood chowder served up at lunch time with freshly baked brown bread. We continue on to Slea Head. Along the way, we will see bee hive style huts, originally inhabited by 12th century monks, which overlook the rugged **Blasket Islands**. The awe inspiring beauty of this particular area is unmatched. There is no other landscape in western Europe with the density and variety of archaeological monuments as found on the Dingle Peninsula. Return to Dingle in the afternoon with some free time to explore and enjoy all this harbor town has to offer. Evening is free to explore the many lively bars and restaurants.

Wednesday, July 31st - BLARNEY CASTLE & KINSALE

After breakfast we depart for **Blarney Castle**. If you need proof of the power of a good yarn, then join the queue to get into this 15th-century castle, one of Ireland's most popular tourist attractions. They're here, of course, to plant their lips on the Blarney Stone, which supposedly gives one the gift of gab. The Blarney Stone is perched at the top of a steep climb up claustrophobic spiral staircases. On the battlements, you bend backwards over a long, long drop (with safety grill and attendant to prevent tragedy) to kiss the stone; Time to visit, shop and have lunch at the famous woolen mills. This shop shouldn't disappoint, with a particularly wide range of cut crystal, porcelain presents and its trademark woolly things. Continue onto the Kinsale - gourmet capital of Ireland. Join your fellow travelers for dinner at Max's Wine Bar - 700 yards from the hotel.

DINNER & OVERNIGHT: ACTON'S HOTEL, KINSALE (B,D)

Thursday, August 1st - CHARLES FORT

Kinsale is famous for its beautiful yachting, sea angling, gourmet restaurants and golf. **Charles Fort**, a popular attraction was constructed in the late 17th century on the site of an earlier coastal fortification. **Charles Fort** is a classic example of a star-shaped fort and has five bastions. The two seaward bastions, the Devil's and the Charles, were for defending the harbor and both are casemated - that is, they have gun embrasures inside as well as on top of the walls. Afternoon is free to explore the many lively bars and restaurants in this town known as the gourmet capital of Ireland.

Friday, August 2nd - ROCK OF CASHEL

After breakfast we'll depart for Dublin via the **Rock of Cashe**. With its well preserved ecclesiastical remains, it is one of Ireland's most spectacular landmarks, rising above the surrounding plain and dominating the land route southward. The large Cathedral, ancient round tower and the very early Romanesque Cormac's Chapel, perched on a dramatic outcrop of rock, were silent witnesses to many of the stirring events of Irish History; St. Patrick converted the local King Aenghus, here in the 5th century; Brian Boru was crowned King of Ireland on this spot in the early 11th Century. Onto to **Carton House** - The estate first came into the ownership of the FitzGerald family shortly after Maurice FitzGerald played an active role in the capture of Dublin by the Normans in 1170 and was rewarded by being appointed Lord of Maynooth, an area covering townlands which include the now luxurious Carton House Hotel Ireland. Located just twenty minutes from Dublin on 1,100 acres of private parkland estate, Carton House Resort is an all-encompassing playground, ideal for leisure, business and any special

occasion. With glass walkways, curving corridors, vibrant canvasses and fashionable upholstery that have been beautifully incorporated in to the design and layout of the bright interior - Carton House Resort retains the most important charm and elements of its original character. Join your fellow travelers for farewell dinner tonight to celebrate James's birthday in the Gold Salon room.

Saturday, August 3rd - RETURN TO THE UNITED STATES

Transfer to Dublin Airport in plenty of time to check in **Aer Lingus flight 119 departing at 12:30pm** for Washington. The beauty of flying from Dublin Airport is that you will clear customs and emigration there. Lines are short in Dublin and then arrival in USA is very simple. There is no Duty Free on board the return flight however but there is ample shopping and duty free stores in the airport.





Camden Court Hotel Dublin

Camden Court Hotel is just a short walk from Dublin's St Stephen's Green. It features a leisure center with a pool and hot tub, sauna and steam room.

The brightly decorated rooms at Camden Court Hotel have free Wi-Fi and TVs. They also include a ironing facilities, hairdryer and tea/coffee-making facilities.

The elegant Iveagh Restaurant serves modern cuisine, while the modern C Central bar has a relaxed atmosphere, light snacks and large flat-screen TVs showing news and sports.

The hotel is on the Luas line, Dublin's tram system, providing excellent access to the city. Dublin Castle and the Temple Bar district are a 10-minute walk away.

Park House Hotel Galway

In central Galway, the Park House Hotel blends the warmth and personality of a boutique hotel with 4-star luxury. It offers an award-winning restaurant and air conditioned rooms with free Wi-Fi.
